Fun Facts



- Tigers are an endangered animal because some humans hunt them and destroy their habitats.
- Tigers that breed with lions give birth to ligers or tigons!
- Tigers are strong swimmers and can swim up to 6km.
- A pack of kittens is called a kindle and a group of adults cats is called a clowder or a glaring.
- A male cat is called a tom and a female cat is called a queen.
- Parrots such as the macaw or cockatoo can live more than 75 years.
- Dogs can dream when they're asleep, just like we do!
- Dogs' noses are wet to help their sense of smell.
- Pet cats love to play, practising new skills for hunting and fighting.
- Goldfish have no eyelids so they have to sleep with their eyes open.
- Goldfish can recognise human faces. They like to see their owner's face as it usually means they are about to be fed!
- Hamsters store food in their stretchy cheek pouches so they can eat it later. Yuck!
- Baby rabbits are called kits and are born blind without any hair.
- Some lizards can detach their tails to escape from predators. (Don't worry – some of them are able to grow them back after a few weeks!)
- Gerbils have very strong muscular hind legs and big back feet which means that they often stand upright rather than crouching down (and they're extremely good at foot thumping!).
- A snake smells the air using its tongue.
- Reptiles (like snakes and lizards) need special equipment to keep them warm if they are kept as pets.
- Dalmatian pups are born pure white.
